Simulations: a innovative teaching and learning method in (political) education

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Introduction

Nowadays decision-makers and opinion leaders often illustrate political decisions as without an alternative – see the debate about the Euro

However: politics is never without an alternative. But: to develop alternative approaches independently, decision-making procedures have to be comprehensible

Some decision-making procedures are very complex and traditional ways of teaching cannot provide adequate insight

Simulations can help to provide this insight better than sole ex-cathedra teaching and offer alternative ways of thinking and acting

What is a simulation?

Simulations are a teaching method to bring students into exceptional learning situations

Simulations consist of three components:

- 1. a (social) environment of the system, i.e. the simulated body (e.g. Council of the EU)
- 2. an interactive simulation component, that describes a current political problem and offers background information to the participants through a role profile
- 3. a rule component, i.e. rules of procedure and decision-making processes

Implementation

A simulation consists of 4 phases:

Preparation

Introduction and distribution of roles

Simulation and negotiation

Evaluation

Advantages from learning through simulations

Practical skills

- strengthen social competences through interaction in a group
- train rhetoric skills through formulating own points of view
- improve negotiation tactics through implementing own positions
- foster creative thinking through building alliances to achieve own goals

Academic knowledge

- insight to multi-dimensional topics
- better understanding of the basic structures of (international) politics
- illustrate the decision making process between interest and power, but also personal values and political ideals
- practical introduction to complex issues
